History of the Department

The Department of Political Science at Narajole Pai College has been an integral part of the institution since its inception in 1966. Initially offering only a General course, the department expanded to include an Honours course in 2002, catering to the growing demand for political science education. Throughout its history. the department has been fortunate to have esteemed educators such as Prof. Prithwish Dutta. Prof. Shaktipada Pal. Prof. Rajkumar Ganguli. Prof. Subrata Chowdhury, and Bhagbat Chandra Nandi as full-time teachers. Additionally, the department has received invaluable assistance from guest teachers like Sri Kalyanashis Bhattacharya, Sri Anindya Sundar Poria, Smt. Monika Satpoti, Smt. Papia Poria. and Sri Saptarshi Dal.

Dresently, the department boasts a team of four faculty members, including Dr. Rajasree Debnath, an Associate Professor, and Sri Supen Sarkar, an Assistant Professor, as well as Sri Barun Rout and Sri Prosenjit Senapoti, both State Aided College Teachers. With a student body of over 200, the Department of Political Science stands as one of the leading departments in the college. Beyond its regular academic offerings, the department has extended its services by conducting various UGC-approved courses, including the Foundation Course in Human Rights Education from 2011-12 to 2015-16, which successfully graduated 469 students who received certificates for their achievements.

Moreover, the department consistently offers at least one Value Added Course and one Add-on Course in each academic session, providing students with a well-rounded education. 

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
